### **Course Proposal**

Course Number: NWC 110 Course Title: Vietnamese Culture (*Edited*)

Semester Hour Credit: 3 Standard Grading: Yes

**Prerequisites: None** 

#### Rationale:

This course is an interdisciplinary introduction to the culture of the Vietnamese people using the various concepts and approaches of the social sciences and the humanities. It surveys the land and people of Vietnam, the Vietnamese language, religions, social values, customs, and family and village politics in changing historical settings. Emphasis is on the formation of Vietnamese culture in relation to the presence of the three major foreign powers in Vietnamese history: China, France, and the United States.

## **Course Description:**

This course takes a multidisciplinary approach by examining the geography, language, history, religion, culture, and social life of Vietnam. Topics to be analyzed include the land and people of Vietnam, Confucianism, Buddhism, Daoism, women's role in traditional and modern Vietnamese societies, traditional world views and healing methods, the resistance and wars against China, France, and the United States and their effects in shaping the socio-economic life and cultural patterns of the Vietnamese People.
