### PREFACE

The manuscript holdings in the Library of Congress for the period 1896-1920 are outstanding in comparison to the personal collections from the Progressive Era and World War I found in other American depositories. The papers of Presidents Theodore Roosevelt, Wilson, Taft, and McKinley and members of their administrations make these holdings especially rich in the fields of domestic politics and foreign affairs.

Union Catalog of Manuscript Collections (NUCMC) does not provide the scholar with all of the tools he needs to use these resources to best advantage. The index of persons is comprehensive, but the subject index is too broad to allow the retrieval of any but the most general topics. More important, the NUCMC is not organized according to the periods of American history. Scholars who reside some distance from Washington must plan their visits so as to provide enough time for the examination of collections that may contain material from 1896 through 1920, even though they know that gaps occur between the beginning and ending dates of most collections. Furthermore, searching for promising entries in several volumes is less efficient than

consulting one specialized work.

The larger project, of which this bibliography is a sample, concentrates upon a single twenty-five year period of American history. "A Guide to Manuscripts in the Library of Congress: American History, 1896-1920" lists every collection that contains as much as one box of material from this era, even though the relevant papers are scattered through several boxes. It also describes holdings of less than one container of manuscripts from 1896-1920 when these papers would seem to be of interest to scholars. The phrase "American history" is defined so as to include the activities of foreign nationals in the United States and its possessions, American citizens abroad, and immigrants who later became citizens, even though they arrived in the United States after 1920.

Of the more than seven hundred collections that appear in the guide, seventy that relate to women's history are presented here. This bibliography describes, in order to provide a theme of current interest to scholars, all manuscript collections for the period 1896-1920 whose main entries include the name of a woman or woman's organization. Other collections, such as family archives, are listed because they contain women's papers that are filed as separate units within larger bodies of papers. Since many if not most of the family members listed are males, men's

papers are well represented in this bibliography; there is, however, a decided quantitative advantage in favor of women's papers.

In Part I, the "Annotated List of Collections," the form of the entries follows closely that of the NUCMC since the guide is intended to supplement, not replace, that work. Main entries, including the catalog numbers, are copied exactly as they appear in the NUCMC. Names of persons whose papers are filed as a unit within the body of a larger collection are placed in brackets at the end of the main entry. Main entries for those collections that are not listed in NUCMC are based upon cards in the Library's manuscript catalog.

The annotation first shows the scope of the entire collection by indicating the type of material, span dates, and its physical dimensions. The general term "papers" is used to describe the larger collections, but smaller units may consist entirely of "scrapbooks" or "diaries." The span provides the dates of the oldest and most recent items in the collection. Physical dimensions are given in linear feet for collections of two or more feet in size, while an estimate of the number of items is provided for smaller collections. Manuscripts are the originals unless another form is indicated; collections on microfilm are described in terms of numbers of reels or feet of microfilm. The portion

of the whole collection that falls within the period 18961920 is expressed as a fraction. The denominator shows the
total number of containers in the collection while the
numerator represents an estimate of the number that could be
filled with material from the period. Thus "25/48" means,
"in a collection of forty-eight containers, material from
the Progressive Era and World War I would fill about twentyfive boxes if it were arranged chronologically." The
accuracy of this estimate, therefore, depends in large part
upon the degree to which the collection reflects a chronological arrangement for the years 1896-1920.

The second paragraph of the annotation sets forth the person's activities during the Progressive Era and World War I. This information is taken from standard biographical sources, the finding aid prepared by the Library, and the collection itself. The most significant activity is usually listed first. Only the period 1896-1920 is considered, thus later and often more important accomplishments are not shown.

The last paragraph summarizes the types of material, subjects covered, and its arrangement. The manuscripts are described in the order in which they are filed by the Library, usually from the most personal to the most general: diaries, family letters, general letters, subject files, speeches, articles, books, printed matter, photographs, memorabilia, and miscellaneous material. Not all categories appear in

each collection; the more general material, furthermore, receives less attention in this bibliography than do diaries, letters, and subject files.

Part II, "Distribution by Type of Material," is the first of several sections that offer somewhat unusual approaches to the retrieval of information from manuscript sources for the purpose of making these papers more useful for studies that go beyond narrative history and biography. Four classifications -- diaries, letters, subject files, and scrapbooks -- occur frequently enough among the collections to warrant their presentation in tabular form. Letters are divided according to correspondent, so that the columns headed "Diaries" and "Family Letters" together provide opportunities for the study of group as well as individual life styles. The quantity of material in each category (expressed in numbers of containers) and the inclusive dates of the material are furnished when this information is available; initials (e.g., SB, Scrapbooks) and question marks appear when precise data are lacking because of the arrangement of the collection. Types of material that occur less frequently, such as "Memoirs," are also represented by initials.

Parts III and IV provide an entrée to the collections according to the birth date, vocation-avocation, and sex of the principals. The numbers of some collections appear two or more times because these collections contain the papers of more than one individual; the numbers of others do not appear at all, since the birth dates or vocations of the principals are not known. The data on vocations are taken from the biographical portion of the annotations, hence the entries reflect only the activities of the principals during the period 1896-1920. Both parts are limited in scope because this bibliography encompasses only seventy collections and has but a single theme; the seven hundred collections included in the larger project contain data on perhaps one thousand individuals whose activities, in contrast, touch upon all aspects of American life.

The vocational-avocational categories are interpreted broadly so as to include those who kept a diary, made known their political affiliation, and/or participated in a volunteer movement; the subdivisions within these groups identify other activities of their members. Thus diarists who were active in the birth control movement are separated from diarists who were poets or editors, Republicans who were governors are listed apart from party members who held no office, and actors who were suffragists are differentiated from the lawyers and club women in the movement.

The final portion of the bibliography is more than a guide to Part I, the Annotated List; it is a comprehensive subject index to the finding aids and collections themselves.

Each finding aid has been examined, and the collections for which no finding aid exists have been sampled, in order to obtain the maximum number of subject entries from the period 1896-1920. The entries have been copied substantially as they appear in the finding aid and on the labels of folders; where possible, dates are given so the scholar can find particular manuscripts more quickly. Numbers that are underlined refer to collections that contain a box or more of material pertaining to one subject, the index entry.

The most complete index entry is that for "Woman suffrage." It begins with a chronological guide to the subjects for which dates are known; these entries are listed according to the beginning date of the span and then by its ending date. Thus material ranging from 1904 to 1923 is entered after material from 1896 to 1906, but before manuscripts from 1914 to 1920 and the single years 1911, 1915, and 1919. Subjects for which no date can be assigned are then combined with the entries from the preceding chronological list to form one alphabetic series in the usual fashion.

This bibliography is the outgrowth of a project intended to test the hypothesis that it is feasible to construct for the Progressive Era and World War I a classed bibliography of about two hundred important manuscript collections held by the Library of Congress and that such a

bibliography, when accompanied by a broad index of some six hundred entries, will be a useful research tool. Every card in the Manuscript Division catalog was examined in order to compile a list of collections whose span dates include at least one year from the period 1896-1920. The finding aids for these collections were then examined to determine if the dates of any manuscripts fall within the period 1896-1920; collections for which no finding aid existed were sampled for the same purpose. If a collection has as much as one box of material from this period, it automatically appears in the bibliography. The material amounting to less than one box in any one collection was evaluated; the collection appears in the bibliography if its importance to scholars was certain or in doubt. Specifically excluded are collections that contain from the Progressive Era and World War I only memorabilia, certificates, printed matter readily available elsewhere, "fair copies" and typescript copies (without holograph corrections or additions) of published works, autograph collections, and genealogical data, charts, and diagrams.

The hypothesis is defective in three ways. Over seven hundred, not two hundred, collections hold a significant amount of manuscript material from the Progressive Era and World War I. This manuscript material is much too diverse to be classified by any but the most bland of subject schedules.

A detailed rather than a broad subject index provides the best access to such a wide-ranging data base.

Scholars across the country have been most generous in their suggestions and encouragement. The bibliography could not have been prepared without the fullest cooperation of the staffs of the Manuscript, Music, and Rare Book Divisions of the Library of Congress. Members of the Department of Library Science, The Catholic University of America, and especially Professors Elizabeth Stone and Rev. James J. Kortendick, S.S., have been particularly helpful. The errors and omissions, however, are my own.
