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Mayor-Elect Hopkins.

Lewis Legrand Hopkins will assume the title of first mayor of the city of Danbury, being elected by a majority of 322, his plurality being 379 over his republican opponent; Mr. Wildman. Mr. Hopkins was born in New Fairfield February 24, 1842, and is therfore forty-seven years of age. When eleven years of age he lost his father and worked for a farmer in New Fairfield for his board and clothing. He afterwards worked as a newsboy on New Jersey railways and also on the Consolidated road. At sixteen he went to sea, going abroad as a common deck hand, and when off the Welch coast his ship was burned to the water's edge, he suffering a fracture of the skull for which he was successfully treated at a hospital in Liverpool. He next turned up in the California gold fields, returning by way of Cape Horn. In 1865 he married and engaged in business in Danbury and New Fairfield, he being town clerk in the latter place for twelve years. In 1870, 71, 75 and '81 he represented New Fairfield in the lower branch of the general assembly, and in 1887 he represented Danbury in the same house. Up to one year ago he was freight agent on the Danbury and Norwalk railway, which place he resigned to accept the wardenship. Mr. Hopkins has been assessor, member of the board of relief, justice of the peace, school committeeman, and for several years a member of the Democratic state central committee for this district. He is identified with many of the local societies.

Mr. Perrett, the newly-elected city clerk, is a native of France. He came to Danbury about twenty years ago. For nine years he was bookkeerer for W. Beckerle & Co., the hat manufacturers.
