

SOLDIERS MAY GO SATURDAY.

Lieutenant Rowan is Mustering in the Meriden Company To-Day.

There is every indication now that Danbury will say farewell to Company M, of the First regiment, this week. Lieut. Rowan, U. S. A., who is to muster the company into the service, is in Meriden to-day, mustering in Company L, also of the First.

The boys of the Danbury company are packing up the Fourth regiment uniforms and equipments to-day, and will ship them to Hartford. They will undoubtedly leave Danbury in civilian dress and will be equipped when they reach the place to which they are ordered.

An order was issued yesterday directing Captain Vincent M. King, commanding Company G, Fourth Regiment, C. N. G., to turn into the quartermaster-general's department at Camp Haven, Niantic, all arms, uniforms and equipments issued by the state. It is understood that the government will equip the Danbury and Meriden companies as soon as they reach Niantic. They are raised for a regiment already in the service and therefore the state has no control or authority over them.

The adjutant-general issued an order yesterday granting permission to Captain Bowen to raise the company to be attached to the First Regiment, Connecticut Volunteers, to be designated as Company L. Officers were appointed as follows:

Captain, Charles B. Bowen, retired, of Meriden; first lieutenant, Delbert R. Jones, of Meriden; second lieutenant, Raymond G. Keeney, of Somerville; first lieutenant and paymaster, of the First Regiment, C. N. G.; all with rank from the date of muster into the United States service. Orders will be issued giving Lieutenant Jones, who is a lieutenant in Company I, Second Regiment, C. N. G., and Lieutenant Keeney, leaves of absence during their service in the volunteer army.

The Meriden Record this morning says:

Lieut. Rowan, with an army surgeon, arrived in Meriden yesterday afternoon, and are located at the Winthrop hotel. This morning, at nine o'clock, Mr. Rowan and the surgeon will begin their work of examining the recruits at the Town Hall. As the surgeon must sign all the examination papers attesting that each man successfully passed, he will look over each man. This he expects will be accomplished in two days, when Lieut. Rowan will muster the men in. They will all be called up in a body, and afterwards each one must sign the enlistment papers.

Capt. Bowen thinks that this will be completed and the men ready to leave town before the end of the week.

FIREMEN VISIT COUNCIL.

And Discuss the Supposed Shortage in Their Appropriation.

A delegation of firemen representing each of the volunteer fire companies of the city called upon the councilmen last evening to discuss the shortage which the firemen claim that there is in their appropriation.

The matter is a peculiar one and seems to have been brought about by the change in the fiscal year when the charter amendments went into effect. The city meeting in 1897 voted \$70 to the volunteer firemen. It was customary to pay the firemen in September and March. As no money could be paid out during March of the present year the \$350 appropriated reverted back into the city treasury. The board of estimate appropriated \$700 and the firemen received their \$350 six weeks late.

The claim of the firemen, or one of the claims, at least, is that the money appropriated by the city meeting was for the last fiscal year and that they received but half of it. The money appropriated by the board of estimate, they say, was for the present year. They have never received all of last year's appropriation.

The mayor and members of the common council say that the firemen received their pay due in March a little late and that they will receive another payment in September. The following March the board of estimate will make another appropriation and things will go along smoothly. The firemen do not see it in that light, however, and ask for the \$350 they say was due during the last fiscal year. The only way for them to get it seems to be to ask the board of estimate to make an appropriation for a deficiency for last year.

This the board of estimate has already declined to do. The board of estimate will probably be called together for a special session and be asked to consider the matter again. The complications which have arisen are numerous and there are at least a dozen explanations of the situation, none of which seem to agree.

A bill from Dr. Barnum for \$10 was referred to the doctor for an explanation.

The bills from the volunteer fire companies were referred to the committee on claims.

A petition for an electric light at the corner of North street and Madison avenue was referred to the committee on lights.

It was voted to pay E. P. Bouton \$30 in settlement of his claim against the city. He is the man whose horse backed off an embankment on Pahquioque avenue several months ago.

The superintendent of public works was instructed to construct a surface water sewer at the corner of West and William streets.

Corporation Counsel Cuff requested that Attorney H. A. Purdy be appointed to assist him in the trial of the tax appeal cases. The appointment was made.

SHUT NEW BRITAIN OUT.

Visiting Ball Team Never in Danger of Scoring a Run Yesterday.

New Britain's ball team came to Danbury yesterday, for a two days' stay, and in yesterday's game were shut out, coldly and cruelly. Never, for a moment, were the New Britain ball murderers in danger of crossing the home plate.

The train bearing the team was an hour and a half late in reaching Danbury, and it was five o'clock before the visitors appeared upon the field. A fair-sized crowd of spectators waited patiently for an hour or more for the coming of the New Britainites, but were sorry that they did for the game that they saw was little more than a comedy upon New Britain's part. The Hatters, however, played championship ball.

Viau, New Britain's best pitcher, did splendid work in the first few innings, and Danbury would have been shut out up to the sixth, except for New Britain's errors. Vidu became disgusted finally and pushed the sphere over the plate as big as a balloon and let the Danbury batsmen do as they liked with it.

Early in the game New Britain's captain, "Lefty" Marr, gave Umpire Murray some back talk and was sent to the bench.
