

In some of the rural sections there is some confusion because registration cards of some men have not been delivered to the Local Board, which has been appointed to consider the cases of men in their town.

This confusion has resulted because the address given by the registrant was a post office address instead of the name of the town in which he actually resides.

For instance - Many men living in Lebanon gave an address of Yantic, RFD, or Franklin, RFD. Several men in Pawcatuck or eastern Stonington gave their address as Westerly, RFD..

In sorting the registration cards, the post office addresses indicated that the men lived in Norwich, Franklin and Westerly, and the Local Boards having jurisdiction over these towns have these cards.

These cards have already been given a serial number.

Since the National Lottery has taken place these cards have acquired order numbers which could not be changed even if it were possible to transfer the cards to the proper Local Board.


This will not result in any unfairness. The registrant will have a similar order number wherever the card is.

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

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


Accept the thanks of Governor Raymond E. Baldwin and this office for your very excellent cooperation in connection with the initial step in Selective Service in Connecticut.

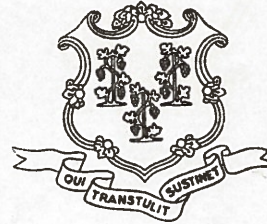

An act of the Congress of the United States and a proclamation of the President has placed upon me the duty of making nominations to the President for the appointment of Selective Service Boards in our several cities and towns. Many people throughout the State have already volunteered for service on these Boards but recommendations from you would be of great assistance.

The best information which we have at the present time indicates that there will be a Board of three members for approximately each 30,000 of the population of the State. This means that in our larger cities there will be several Boards, that in our towns of approximately 30,000 population there will be a separate Board for each town and that the rural areas will be districted, such districts to include approximately 30,000 population.

I would be very pleased to have your suggestions at your first convenience.

Appeal Procedure

Any person entitled to do so may take an appeal to the board of appeal within 10 days after the above date of mailing of Notice of Classification to registrant in either of the following ways:

- (1) By filing with the local board a written notice of appeal. Such notice need not be in any particular form but must state the name of the registrant and the name and identity of the person appealing so as to show the right of appeal.
- (2) By signing the "Appeal to Board of Appeal" on the Selective Service Questionnaire (Form 40).

The person appealing may attach to his notice of appeal or to the Selective Service Questionnaire (Form 40) a statement specifying the respects in which he believes the local board erred, may direct attention to any information in the registrant's file which he believes the local board has failed to consider or give sufficient weight, and may set out in full any information which was offered to the local board and which the local board failed or refused to include in the registrant's file.

Appeal to the President from classification by the board of appeal may be taken at any time within 10 days after the date of mailing of notice to registrant, provided the registrant was classified by the board of appeal in either Class I-A, Class I-A-O, or Class IV-E and one or more members of the board of appeal dissented from such classification. Otherwise, the decision of the board of appeal is final except when an appeal is taken to the President either by the State Director of Selective Service or the Director of Selective Service on the ground that he deems it to be in the national interest or necessary to avoid an injustice.
