AUTO JUMPS DITCH.

Unidentified Car Wrecked on Starrs Plain Road.

The wreck of a seven-passenger Buick touring car, just off the Sugar Hollow road, on the Starrs Plain road, attracted considerable attention Saturday afternoon. The number plates had been removed from the wreckage and nothing was found to indicate where or to whom the car belonged.

It is reported that there were three men in the car, which went down Sugar Hollow at a rate estimated at sixty miles an hour. When near the road leading off to Starrs Plain the car got out of control of the driver and smashed into the highway fence. Then it crashed into a stone wall, veered off and, jumping over a ditch, a distance of at least four feet, landed at the side of the road, and then overturned.

Apparently none of the occupants of the car was injured and the men disappeared before their identity was learned.

SATURDAY NIGHT RAID.

Police Make Arrests on White St. on Two Counts.

Shortly after nine o'clock Saturday night Captain D. W. Bradley, and Special Policeman Mazza and Barrett visited the apartments of Mrs. Rose Mayer, 75 White street, armed with a search and seizure warrant. They arrested Mrs. Mayer on the liquor charge and also pressed the charge of maintaining a house of ill fame against her as the result of conditions they found when they entered the place.

A woman giving the name of Margaret Potter, of this city, and a man who said he was Thomas Shehan, of New London, were arrested, each charged with frequenting a house of ill fame. Mrs. Mayer furnished bail in \$200 and the two frequenters later obtained bonds of \$25 each.

This morning in the City court all three forfeited the bonds.

ANOTHER VICTIM DIES.

Total of New Haven Fire Fatalities Now Eight.

New Haven, Dec. 5.—Mrs. Mary Kelly, 37, died at the hospital today, making the eighth person to die from the Rialto theatre fire of a week ago last night, her six-year-old daughter Marie, remains on the list of those in serious condition and is the last patient so regarded among those at the New Haven hospital. Of the entire list of patients in all the hospitals, whose names have been on the list of those in extreme condition four were removed to-day, because of a change for the better. Those were the names of Mrs. Minnie Cook, of Fair Haven; Mrs. Agnes Tate, of Hamden; Thomas Shanley and Howard Ferrigo. Tilton Doolittle, Yale student, was reported as improving.

Bomb Wrecks Building.

Detroit, Mich., Dec. 5.—A bomb explosion late last night, wrecked a building on East High street, occupied by three commission houses. Police said they suspected it was the result of a Black Hand feud. No one was injured.
