Thus, I shared this idea with the Ancell School of Business (i.e., MBA Office, etc.) to develop/extend a similar Academic Study Abroad Program at the MBA Level with the University in the country of Morocco. If this opportunity is realized, this will create additional opportunity to satisfy the need to provide an international business perspective to our undergraduate and graduate business students.

D. Professional Benefits Arising From Sabbatical:

- 1. The data that I have gathered has publication potential at a quality publication outlet(s) and that these two topics are areas rich for future research studies. The aim is to submit research papers based on the two important proposed research studies/projects. Publications in quality peer-review academic journals and practitioners' oriented publications further enhance the reputation and the prestige of our University.
- 2. As indicated, my research activities during my sabbatical leave centered on the following topical area: consumer behavior within a cross-nations/cultural perspective (include cross-nations comparisons of consumers). Additionally, the activities focused on the role of culture in ethical decision-processes. My research work seeks to study the validity of marketing theories and models developed for the U.S. market in cross-cultural setting. Furthermore, my effort is carried not only to assess the validity and the

applicability of these theoretical models to other Western nations, but also to non-Western nations. There has been very little research done in this context. By addressing these gaps and building on previous research, my research goal is to make contribution to the marketing theory. The gained knowledge from my proposed research project and overseas travel are also beneficial to the University.

3. The gained knowledge is beneficial in my teaching and the University. My strong teaching and research interests in global/cross-cultural business, along with my experiences in being overseas during my sabbatical, are making a great contribution to our University regarding global and intercultural education.

Specifically, the information and knowledge gained are being integrated in my teaching/courses: Global Environment of Business (MKT 201) and the International Business Strategy course (MBA level). Sharing this information with my students is stimulating and deepen the understanding of the different challenges and solutions in dealing with these realities facing businesses and societies in various parts of the world. This is important since we live in a global economy.

E. Conclusion:

This sabbatical has served as an invaluable opportunity for me to integrate international business ethics and impact of culture on consumer values and store selection into my teaching and research stream. The sabbatical has also allowed me to devote needed time and effort to gather data and a manuscript preparation. This support allowed me to devote more time to reading the rapidly expanding body of work and relevant literature in these two important topical areas in the International Marketing/Business field which is already reflected in my teaching, research, and service.
