

NEW YORK DISCONTINUES LOYALTY OATH REQUIREMENT

NEW YORK - The beard of sperintendents here has dropped the requirement that high school seniors must sign a levalty eath before receiving their diplomas. Instead, the students will recite an eral pledge at graination exercises.

Last March, the signed eath was challenged by a senior at Bayside High School in Queens who viswed the requirement as a firm of coercion and violatien of his principles. He and four others who had refused te sign, received their diplams ayway. The requirement was waived until action could be taken by the board.

Today, as we know, sanity is at a premium, something we look for, pray for—now that the season of Peace is at hand—but somehow don't really expect to find in the latter half of the twentieth century. The swastika of our times is the mark of insanity. Modern art hasn't overlooked it.

A hundred, or two hundred or even three hundred years ago, modern art was considered by most conservatives to be a trifle eccentric, by which was simply meant a bit off-center, and on some few occasions it was considered insane too, but that was rare. But then, of course, genius was always somewhat suspects Van Gogh and Blake were not warmly received in their day and the chances are that perhaps they really were deranged by the world's standards. Today's world standards make derangement a great deal more difficult to spot in art. that Red China must be admitted into the United Nations if world peace is to become world reality. Is Mr. X a communist?

Thursday night, a "freedom rider" spoke in Berkshire Auditorium to a small group of freedom-loving spotators.

These freedom rides are sponsored by a group called C O R E-Congress of Racial Equality. According to many voices of conservative reaction within our freedom-lowing country, CORE is a Communist front or Agitation organization.

Undoubtedly, there are Communists in this organization but does this mean it is a Communist Front Organization??

We must differentiate between Communist agitation and democratic social action. We must not crucify the Mr.X's with nails of emotional reaction.

Racial prejudice is a definite force of unAmericanism in our country. Organizations such as CORE would not exist if this racial problem did not exist. Democratic action groups are directly motivated by the antisocial forces which conflict with the basic principles of our freedom-loving country.

If a man has enough guts

to non-violently oppose existent anti-social forces, he should deserve the respect of the society which has conceived the evils he is against.


