Intercollegiate Tennis Tournament

Danbury was represented at the annual Eastern Women's Intercollegiate Tennis Tournament at the West Side Tennis Club, Forest Hills, N.Y. over the weekend of October 12-14.

There were 174 players representing 66 eastern women's colleges, including Vassar,

Radcliffe, Barnard, and many others. The tournament was sponsored jointly by Barnard and Briarcliff Colleges together with the Eastern Lawn Tennis Assoc.

Ann Ceruzzi and Helen Hermes entered the singles events. Linda Morris and Myra Prindle entered as a doubles team. Ann had the bad luck to meet stiff competition in her first round and was eliminated early in the tournament, but the others went on farther.

Helen Hermes outplayed a strong contestant from Sargent College, but was defeated in the second round.

Morris and Prindle were shot ahead two rounds by a bye and a default. In the third round, they met and beat a team from Radcliffe. This landed them in the quarter finals of the tournament, played on Saturday afternoon. An experienced doubles team from Middlebury College proved their downfall, and thus Danbury was all through for the year.

The WAA of the College partially covered the expenses of those entering the tournament, as they were lucky enough to find beds at the home of friends nearby. It was an exciting and satisfying experience to play tennis here at Forest Hills, the "Yankee Stadium" of the tennis world, and in the midst of sharp competition.
