# OBITUARY

Mrs. Albert J. Potter

Lydia J. Van Housen Potter died at Danbury hospital Monday night at 10:45 of heart failure. She had been there only about three hours, then passed quietly and painlessly away.

She was born in Prattsburgh, Steuben county, N. Y., June 21, 1857; attended Franklin academy there, then Ingham college at Le-roy, N. Y., and then the University of Michigan, at Ann Arbor, Mich., where she took the B.A. degree in June, 1880. Her husband was a member of the same class at Ann Arbor and was graduated with her.

After being graduated she taught college preparatory classes in several high schools and academies, including private schools for girls in New York city. Being always of an intellectual nature, she later studied in special courses at Columbia university and took the M.A. degree there.

Her father, Abram Van Housen, had a farm at the edge of Prattsburgh village, and, being farm reared, she was always fond of farm life and loved the cultivation of fruits and flowers. She was a woman of high attainments and fond of country life, although with her husband she had spent fully half her life in cities.

She leaves, besides her husband, a son, Harold Potter, a well-known music arranger in New York city, and a granddaughter, Lorraine, living in Brooklyn, N. Y.

Private funeral services will be followed by cremation at Ferncliff, N. Y.
