No fuel coupons are available for distribution at the Local War Price and Rationing board offices, it was announced today.

The local board annou-that fuel and range oil cou-will not be distributed until some day next week— date to be announced in

date to be announced in the News-Times. Those who did not secure their rations at the High school during the two days set apart this week must call when the new dates are announced, it was stated.

Persons who feel that errors may have been made in their original applications have been advised not to call the board's office, but to await dates on which they may appear before the fuel panel to state their cases. A review of several cases where insufficient ration was claimed reveals the fact that in nine out of ten cases the original application was improperly nine out of ten cases the original application was improperly filled out and only a portion of the dwelling area stated This resulted in a reduced ration—but the error is the individual's, and not the board's or the person who computed the application, board officials said.

The public was advised today that no provision is made in the regulations for replacement of lost coupon sheets, and consumers are warned to guard them carefully.

"We believe the majority of citizens will voluntarily observed the reduced speed limits established for the purpose of conservin our curtailed gasoline and rubbs supplies," he said, "but we als know that there is the usual minority group that is not observing the limits. That is the group we in the property of the control of of the contr

tor Vehicles to furnish him with the names of violators.
Commenting further Mr. Bowle also said that his office will appreciate local enforcement officia notifying OPA of the names opersons whom they apprehen violating the speed laws.
"Not only do we wish to conserve frame on the home front," he continue "but, we also want to conserve for the boys on the fighting front Everty times we operate at excessive rates of speed we are burnin up rubber and gasoline which o boys need in Tunisia, the Solomon and on other fighting fronts."
