DISCUSS WAR CURRICULUM

School Superintendent Tells Board Matter Is Still Confused

The matter of converting the Danbury High school program of studies to conform with the federal government's suggestion for giving the utmost possible pre-induction training to boys and for keying the entire school to wartime conditions, is still in a confused state, Superintendent of Schools Walter P. Sweet told the members of the board of education at its monthly meeting last night.

"In its exaggerated form" he said, "it would mean throwing aside the entire program as it exists at present and concentrating on a pre-induction schedule of training." While it is not believed that this extreme measure will need to be taken, the question of how far to go in this direction is still being studied by the committee of teachers which has been appointed to act in an advisory capacity. "It will be a difficult program to operate without hurting somebody or overdoing it," Mr. Sweet declared.

The matter of granting diplomas to the boys who are taken into the army before completion of their senior year was also discussed from the standpoint of whether the old values represented by a high school diploma are to be retained or whether the situation will call for some special type of diploma for those whose course was left uncompleted. Mr. Sweet said that both he and Principal Roscoe C. Bassett had talked with every boy who has left thus far, encouraging him to return after he has completed his army service and finish his course. He said he believed it was necessary to assure these boys that their rights are being protected in this way, insofar as is possible.

The delegation expected to appear in behalf of town support for the Day Nursery project, did not make an appearance at last night's meeting because of still incomplete organization of its plans. It was voted to hold a special meeting of the board in the near future, if this committee should so request, in order to give the matter full discussion and consideration.

Judge William H. Cable, president of the board, brought up the fact that three sub-committees appointed some time ago, to keep in touch with phases of school life and to make reports and recommendations to the entire board, had not been active and inquired why. These committees were to follow up matters pertaining to high school athletics, music and the cafeteria.

Mr. Cable requested these committees to get together soon and make their reports to the board. Resolutions on the death of the Rev. Dr. Aaron C. Coburn, for eighteen years a member of the board, were adopted.
