RY NEWS-TIMES DISCUSS WAR CURRICULUM

School Superintendent Tells Board Matter Is Still Confused.

The matter of converting the Danbury High school program of studies to conform with the federal government's suggestion for giving the utmost possible pre-induction training to boys and for keying the entire school to wartime conditions, is still in a confused state, Superintendent of Schools Waiter P. Sweet told the members of the board of education at its monthly meeting last night.

"In its exaggerated form" he said." it would mean throwing aside the entire program as it exists at present and concentrating on a pre-induction schedule of training." While it is not believed that this extreme measure will need to be taken, the question of how far to go in this direction is still being studied by the committee of teachers which has been appointed to act in an advisory capacity. "It will be a difficult program to operate without hurting somebody or overdoing it," Mr. Sweet declared.

The matter of granting diplomas to the boys who are taken into the army before completion of their senior year was also discussed from the standpoint of whether the old values represented by a high school diploma are to be retained or whether the situation will call for some special type of diploma for those whose course was left uncompleted. Mr. Sweet said that both he and Principal

He said he believed it was necessary to assure these boys that their rights are being protected in this way, insofar as is possible.
