



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Left: Memorial Hall also known as the Student Center is the center of student life on the WestConn campus. The building was built in 1959 and houses various club offices as well as student services. Among its contents are the cafeteria, information center, commuter snack bar, the bookstore and student lounges.

Right: Old Main is the original building at Western, which in 1903 was known as Danbury Normal School. At one time it housed the entire school from classrooms to administrative offices to the gymnasium. Now, the building has the administration offices along with the various student services, and the computer center.

















*Top Left:* The Ruth Haas Library is a 23 year old building that houses over 150,000 volumes. Within the library there are special collections such as the musical items in the Ives Music Room, government documents, periodicals, and an extensive curriculum collection.

Left, Top Right: Berkshire Hall is a two-story building with a wide variety of uses. It contains the Bill Williams Gymnasium, the Roberts Avenue and studio theaters, the foreign language and writing labs, the weight room, as well as various athletic and academic offices.








Top and Left: Higgins Hall, built in 1959, is located in the center of the Midtown campus. It houses the planetarium, observatory, weather center, 24-hour computer lab, and a greenhouse. It also has the math, physics/astronomy, biology, chemistry, environmental, meteorology, and year-book offices.

Right: White Hall is located in what was once Danbury High School. The building houses the offices for the departments of social sciences, philosophy, art, music, nursing, social work, psychology and history. It also has practice rooms, an A/V room and the Ives Concert Hall.
















Far Left: Litchfield Hall is the largest of the Midtown residence halls. It houses up to 245 students in both triple and double rooms. The 24 year old building houses both male and female students.

Middle: Fairfield Hall is the oldest residence hall at Western. The nearly 70 year old building is an all female hall and offers double and triple rooms.

*Right:* Newbury Hall is the newest of the Midtown residence halls at 20 years old. It is a coeducational facility and houses residents on its top four floors. On the main level, there is the Housing Office, the Counseling Center and the Campus Ministry Office.





Far Right: The Westside Classroom building houses the Ancell School of Business, as well as the departments of justice and law administration, accounting, finance, MIS, math/computer science, management and education. It also has the Robert S. Young Library, Westside Computer Center, President's Reception Room, and the Advanced Technology Classroom.

*Right:* Ella Grasso Hall is an apartment style residence hall which houses students in apartments of up to six students. Originally, the building was meant to house non-traditional students. Now any resident student may reside there through a lottery process.

Below: The William A. O'Neill Athletic and Convocation Center had its ground breaking ceremony in November of 1990 and is scheduled for opening sometime in early 1993. It will contain a gymnasium, a swimming pool, as well as many other facilities.

























Top Left: The new University Health Services location outside of Litchfield Hall on the Midtown campus. The addition opened for service in the spring semester of 1992.


Around Page: Common sights around campus include, the "happy bus", "no parking" outside of Old Main, the crowded lot for commuters, and studying at the Westside.





To try is to risk failure . . .



### FAREWELL PRESIDENT









#### STEPHEN FELDMAN

For past eleven years, Stephen Feldman served as President of Western Connecticut State University. Awarded prestigious University status in 1983, Western has undergone significant changes during Dr. Feldman's tenure as president. Today, Western is an academically challenging, multi-purpose University serving 6,000 students and enriching the cultural life of the greater Danbury area.

Dr. Feldman successfully campaigned for state and private monies, bringing millions of dollars in gifts and grants to the University. Despite the increasingly conservative fiscal climate, over \$26 million in capital expenditures was allocated to campus projects and renovations. Equipment and computer budgets increased tenfold and the annual library budget has quadrupled. Additionally, projects such as the Ella Grasso Residence Hall and the O'Neill Athletic and Convocation Center on the Westside were developed.

Dr. Feldman directed his efforts to raising the standing of the University, resulting in higher admissions standards and the recruitment of outstanding faculty. The number of faculty members who hold Ph.D.'s and other terminal degrees has increased dramatically. New programs have been instituted, including the only Connecticut degree program in meteorology; the MBA program in the Ancell School of Business; a Master's degree in Nursing, and an expansion and redesign of the arts program.

During his presidency, Dr. Feldman co-authored his second book, wrote numerous articles and served on the Board of Directors for Danbury Health Systems, the holding company of Danbury Hospital. He also served on the Board of Directors of Ethan Allen Inc., the Board of Directors of the Danbury Chamber of Commerce, the Board of Directors of Science Horizons, and the Board of Trustees of the United Way.

Dr. Feldman was appointed by the American Association of State Colleges and Universities as national chairman of the committee on university-industry relationships. He has lectured at the Sloan School of Business at MIT, to IBM management groups, and before other corporate and civic groups. He is a recognized leader in the field of quality programming in higher education.

Dr. Feldman, his wife Connie, and their two children, Jennifer and Timothy, will be missed by the university community. We extend to them our best wishes as they embark on the next phase of their lives at Nova University in Fort Lauderdale, Florida.
