EDITOR'S NOTE

CLIO is now in its second year of publication. Accordingly, we want to define CLIO for our readers and establish our publication standards and procedures.

CLIO is a student publication, issued three times each school year by the Sigma Eta Chapter of Phi Alpha Theta (the International History Honor Club) in cooperation with the History Club. CLIO is financed by the Student Government Association (through the History Club) and the generosity of private donors. While the journal is free to all students, faculty, and staff, contributions are encouraged and appreciated. Mail subscriptions average \$2.50 to cover cost and handling.

What type of articles does CLIO welcome? Obviously, articles with historical themes fit best into a history journal. However, contributors are not necessarily history students or faculty. Flexibility exists within the three broad categories:

- (1) foot-noted research papers--minimum 6 pages; maximum 12 pages.
- (2) essays (on historical events, personalities; satire; personal experiences) minimum 4 pages; maximum 8 pages,
- (3) reviews--book, movie, magazine, drama--minimum 3 pages; maximum 4 pages.

Writing Hints and Editorial Policy

- (1) Eliminate padding and get to the point. We do consider publishing longer articles of superior content and style.
- (2) Type (double-space) your article. Untyped papers are automatically returned for typing.
- (3) Title your paper.
- (4) Proofread carefully. Minor spelling, punctuation and grammar errors are acceptable and correctable--sloppily written work is not.
- (5) Please note: CLIO is not the place for airing political views.
- (6) Deadlines are strictly enforced. See CLIO's Newsletter for the date.

Publication Procedure

CLIO has tentative plans for a publication board. The procedure would run as follows. Each contributor submits his (her) article to the student editors. After preliminary corrections for spelling, grammar, and punctuation, the editors pass articles along to the publication board, consisting of three faculty members. With-

in one month, the publication board returns articles to contributors with recommendations for the final copy. Contributors then resubmit papers to the student editors. Hopefully, this procedure eliminates delay in publication and insures strong issues.

Again, this final, important note. CLIO welcomes articles from the entire WesConn community--history to business administration majors, graduates and undergraduates, faculty and employees and all persons interested in WesConn's continued growth.
