NEWSPAPERS OF DANBURY

Introduction: This register was compiled in the fall, 1975 by Jeffrey Morris, a History major at Western Connecticut State College as a student developed study project. It lists copies of newspapers published in Danbury, Connecticut which may be found on file in the Scott-Fanton Museum, Danbury Public Library and the Ruth A. Haas Library.

I. DANBURY SCOTT-FANTON MUSEUM

This museum has the basic collection of original newspapers from the late eighteenth and nineteenth centuries. They are listed here in chronological order based on those copies of the newspapers on file, which generally correspond to the order of their dates of publication. Chronological order is at times interrupted owing to simultaneous publication dates of two papers.

There is also a copy from Tues. Mar. 5, 1850, by which time the paper was marked "William S. Pomeroy, editor & proprietor")--

II. DANBURY PUBLIC LIBRARY RUTH HAAS LIBRARY, WESTERN CONNECTICUT STATE COLLEGE

Both these libraries contain identical microfilm collections prepared, apparently, under the auspices of the <u>Danbury News-Times</u>, covering the period 1837 to the present. Labeling of the collection is, at times, misleading. Its actual contents are outlined below.

Danbury Times (weekly) 1837-1870 Vol. I, No. 1: July 5, 1837; Vol. 36, No. 40: Mar. 10, 1870 (last)

Microfilms from this first period are erroneously labeled "Danbury Evening News" which did not yet exist. Reel #1 contains the note "Jan-June 1837 is missing", an obvious mistake since the Times did not begin publishing until July. However, also noted as missing are July 1841-June 1842 from Reel 1, and July 1844-June 1845, July 1847-Dec. 1849 from Reel 2.

Danbury News (weekly) 1870-1884 (see p. 3 for explanation of Vol. I, No. 1: Mar. 17, 1870 formation of this newspaper)

The Evening News (daily except Wednesday and Sunday) 1884-1890

Danbury Evening News (same) 1890-1933

Danbury News-Times (daily) 1933-present

J.M. Bailey, publisher of the News, began the daily Evening News in 1884. However, the weekly paper was continued simultaneously, being a morning paper on Wednesdays, and was included in a subscription to the Evening News, which did not publish on Wednesday. Unfortunately, the microfilm collection switches over to The Evening News in 1884 but excludes the Danbury News after that point. Thus, the only copies of the weekly paper after 1884 available in Danbury are the originals in the Scott-Fanton Museum. (see I).

In 1890, Mr. Bailey acquired a new printing press, and The Evening News took on a new size and appearance. The masthead was changed to Danbury Evening News, although The Evening News continued to appear on all the rest of the pages. The complete story of this change, along with a history of the newspaper from its beginning as the Times, appears on page 1 of the issue of Tuesday, Feb. 25, 1890.

After J.M. Bailey's death, the paper was continued by Flint & Smith. By 1933, the publisher was Danbury News Publishing Co. On Monday, Jan. 30, 1933, the paper became the <u>Danbury News-Times</u> (Vol. 51, No. 1) having merged with (actually, absorbed) The <u>Danbury Times</u>. This was a new paper using the old Times name. The only copy of it which could be located is that of Monday evening, April 7, 1930, Vol. 4, No. 83, and can be found in the Scott-Fanton Museum. It was apparently a victim of poor timing, having begun publication just in time for the Depression.
